
God is not asking for to give up something to show our connection. Christ is calling us to do something with our lives that can make a difference in someone else's life.

Grab your sweetie, friends, or family, and join us for a great night FUMC.


Conference

Care New from Stephen Ministry *Three Essentials for an Empathy Mindset*

Empathy is a powerful way to better understand others, forge stronger relationships, and care for those who are hurting. If everyone empathized with each other more often, it could go a long way toward overcoming the division, isolation, and misunderstanding that are so prevalent today.

But empathy doesn't just happen on its own. To see its benefits in our lives and the lives of others, we need to be intentional about putting this skill into action. That means developing and maintaining an empathy mindset.

Here are three essentials for doing that:

1. Be Open to the Other Person's Experiences

Empathizing with someone isn't complicated and doesn't mean putting a great deal of pressure on yourself to say or do the right thing. In fact, the starting point is simply being open to listening to and learning about the other person's experiences and feelings. Maintaining this attitude of openness is critical to empathy. All you need to bring is a willingness to listen and understand. Be open to hearing what the other person has to say about their experiences.

2. Be Willing to Make a Personal Connection

Empathy isn't something you can do at a distance without actually interacting with the other person. True empathy only occurs when we make a personal connection— when we directly interact with someone by listening, asking questions to encourage more sharing, and being present as they tell their story. A personal connection unlocks the power of empathy, giving us the opportunity to listen and respond—to let the person know we've heard them, understand what they're saying, and care about what they're going through.

3. Be Focused on the Other Person

One of the many blessings of offering empathy is that it puts the focus on the other person for a time, letting them know that their feelings are valid, their experiences are important, and someone cares about them. However, a number of pitfalls can interfere with this benefit, unintentionally diminishing what they're sharing. Giving advice, talking about your own experiences, trying to ease the person's pain by talking about the positives—they all shift the focus away from what the other person is feeling and onto whatever we're saying. But when we maintain an empathy mindset, we keep the other person and their needs at the center of the conversation. stephenministries.org/caremail


