Active Listening Tips

James 1:19 Let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak. Listening is an important skill in all areas of our lives. Listening actively is an art. When we are actively listening, we are concentrating on what is being said. We are not trying to relate the conversation back to our own thoughts, experiences, and feelings. Active listening is helpful in many situations, but it is especially helpful during times of conflict or when speaking with someone who is hurting. The following are some tips on how to be an effective active listener:

- 1. STAY PRESENT: When you "stay present" you are in the moment. Do not get distracted thinking about the things on your "to do" list. Stay focused on the speaker, remain quiet, and eliminate interruptions and distractions.
- 2. BE CURIOUS: Ask thoughtful follow-up questions. Show that you want to know more.
- 3. NO JUDGMENT: You want the other person to feel safe, so be careful giving your own opinions.
- 4. BE EMPATHIC: Empathetic listening involves listening for understanding and reflecting back the emotions you heard. The speaker will share more when you validate without judgment.
- 5. BE PATIENT: Processing difficult emotions takes time. Be patient with the process.



6. LISTEN FOR UNDERSTANDING: You may not ever fully appreciate what the other person has experienced, but you should listen with empathy and love.
